

Foundations for Family Finances

Central Truth

Christians should use biblical principles to manage money.

Key Verse: Matthew 6:33

Seek ye first the kingdom of God, and his righteousness; and all these things shall be added unto you (KJV).

Seek first his kingdom and his righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well (NIV).

Introducing the Study

Money management is an important part of our lives, so we need to know what God says about it. In this study, we will look at three different aspects of biblical financial principles. From these three aspects we will draw specific principles to guide us in financial matters.

It is also important to educate our children in this area. If they watch us give faithfully, they will learn to give faithfully. If we acknowledge God as our Provider, our children will learn to keep material things in perspective.

1. Describe several specific biblical financial principles.
2. Explain why following biblical financial principles is important.
3. Desire to manage their money according to biblical financial principles.



2 Corinthians 9:6. Remember this: Whoever sows sparingly will also reap sparingly, and whoever sows generously will also reap generously.

7. Each man should give what he has decided in his heart to give, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver.

8. And God is able to make all grace abound to you, so that in all things at all times, having all that you need, you will abound in every good work

Notes

1. Avoid Materialism
A. Warning Against Greed
Luke 12:13–19

Luke 12:13–21 is commonly known as the Parable of the Rich Fool. Jesus was in the middle of teaching when someone in the crowd asked Him to arbitrate an argument about an inheritance (verse 13).

Ask: "In what ways can money matters create problems in a family, particularly in a marriage?" An attitude of selfishness on the part of any family member can show itself in greed. Parents must set the example of sharing freely with each other and with the children during the growing years of the family. Parents must also teach the children how to share and give them opportunities for sharing time, possessions, household tasks, and money.

Parents also need to anticipate the time they will not be around and prepare the family to share their resources fairly. Nothing should be left to chance that could cause friction among the children after one or both parents have died. Every couple needs a will or a revocable trust to define clearly how the family estate is to be divided among the survivors. They should also make sure to provide information regarding the location of important papers and insurance policies.

Instead of doing as the man asked, Jesus asked a question to reveal that it was not His place to act as a judge in such a matter. He then took the opportunity to teach about greed (verse 14). He warned that we are to be on guard against greed, pointing out that life does not consist of material possessions (verse 15).

To illustrate His point, Jesus told a parable about a rich man who became even richer when his fields

produced a bumper crop (verse 16). Instead of thanking God for this blessing or thinking of others who might benefit from some of his bounty, the man worried about how to store his great wealth (verse 17). He decided to tear down his existing barns and build bigger ones (verse 18). Once this decision was reached, he relaxed, confident that his needs and wants would be taken care of for many years. He planned on living the good life (verse 19).

It is often easy to feel secure in our own ability to earn and save money. But God wants us to trust Him for our future. If we put more faith in the provisions than in the Provider, we are in trouble.

B. Results of Greed
Luke 12:20,21

Teaching Tip 1: Have students present the skit referred to in last week's Looking Ahead section.

Ask: "What is God's attitude toward those who trust in their possessions instead of in Him?" In this parable, God called the rich man a fool (Luke 12:20)! That gives us a pretty good idea of how God views materialism. In fact, the rich man was going to die the very night he thought he had it made. And who would benefit from his riches after he died? He couldn't take anything with him.

Ask: "What are some of the reasons the rich man was considered a fool?" The rich man was not described as being immoral or dishonest. Indeed, it seems hard work and good management, along with God's blessings, had yielded great abundance. Yet he had several problems. First, he was totally self-absorbed. Everything revolved

around him. There is no mention of others at all.

Second, he gave no thought to God's role in his life. He was focused on what he had and what he would do in the future.

Third, he assumed he was the master of his destiny. He thought he had his future planned out, but it was not in his control. His life was unexpectedly taken from him.

"This is how it will be," the Bible says, for anyone who allows greed to overtake him (verse 21, NIV). Instead of being overly concerned with material things, we are to be rich in the things of God.

Teaching Tip 2: Hand out the work sheet "How to Be Rich." Allow students a few minutes to complete the work sheet and then briefly discuss their answers.

2. Give Faithfully

A. Tithe

Malachi 3:8-11;
Proverbs 3:9,10

Teaching Tip 3: Some people teach that tithing is an Old Testament Law and Christians are not subject to the Law (Galatians 5:18). However, tithing was before the Law (Genesis 14:20) and Jesus confirmed tithing (Matthew 23:23). Yet even if it were simply an Old Testament Law which Christians would not necessarily be subject to, it would still be a principle from the Old Testament to teach Christians both the joy and blessings of giving.

Tithing is giving the first ten percent of one's income to God. Tithing is also a subject many people would

rather not discuss. In Malachi 3:8-11, God says that if we don't give tithes and offerings, we are robbing Him (verses 8,9)! Sometimes God uses strong words to get our attention. "Robbed" might seem extreme in describing the withholding of tithes, but this is only because the natural mind has difficulty comprehending the seriousness of disobeying God's commands. The Bible teaches that everything is God's. What we have is merely entrusted to us to be used properly with our responsibility to the Lord always in mind. If we don't give our tithes and offerings to God, we are under a curse.

But on the other hand, if we do give our tithes and offerings, God has given us some promises. **Ask: "What are some of the benefits of tithing?"** According to verse 10, we can expect a great outpouring of blessing. This may be material or spiritual blessings. God delights in blessing His children in meaningful, personal ways.

God has also promised to watch over what we already have (verse 11). In biblical times, this meant protection of crops and flocks of animals. We can easily translate this into our own lives in today's society.

Teaching Tip 4: Allow one or two students to testify to God's provision as a result of tithing. Hand out the work sheet "Offering of Thanks." Allow time for students to complete the work sheet, and then ask for two or three students to read their psalm out loud. Thank God together for His provision.

In addition to the blessing aspect, it's important to remember what our tithes are used for. Our tithes help to support the body of Christ. When we joyfully give our tithe to our

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local church, we are literally paying the bills for the advancement of God's kingdom. We are investing in something of eternal value when we do what God has commanded in this area.

Proverbs 3 gives us another look at the same principle. Verse 9 encourages us to honor the Lord with the first part of our income. This is an important principle to teach our children. We don't give our tithe to God solely out of obedience or obligation, but because it is another means of honoring Him. We want our children to get the big picture: If we honor God in every area of our lives, He will make himself known to us. Blessing will be a large part of our lives, because that's how God likes to work. But our motive for giving to God and living for Him should not be to receive. Receiving will be a by-product of seeking Him and living to honor Him every day of our lives.

Verse 10 tells us that if we do honor God by giving, our barns will overflow and our presses will brim with new wine. To put that in modern-day language, we will have plenty. That's the kind of God we serve.

B. Give Offerings

1 Corinthians 16:1-3;
2 Corinthians 9:6-8

The apostle Paul gave the Corinthian believers some practical financial advice. In 1 Corinthians 16, Paul instructed them on how to collect an offering for their fellow believers in Jerusalem (verse 1). He stipulated that each person should set aside some money each week toward the offering (verse 2). This money was to be saved by each individual until Paul came. Then all would bring their offering and put it with the others'. In this way, Paul

said, no collection would have to be taken up while he was there.

God is an orderly God. He is pleased when we give with purpose. Many believers will give sacrificially when presented with an emotional appeal for money. Yet consider the joy of saving an amount for weeks or months, then presenting the sum to God for a specific purpose—perhaps a missions project or a brother in need. This kind of giving is a legacy your children will never forget.


Teaching Tip 5: Have a volunteer read 1 Corinthians 16:2 out loud. **Ask, "How are believers to give?"**

Each believer is to give in accordance with his or her own income. There are to be no guilt trips for those who gave little, nor pride among those who are able to give much. God has entrusted all of us with varying amounts of material wealth. It is up to us to seek Him for our individual financial plan.

Verse 3 brings out the need for accountability in financial matters. Paul wanted the Corinthian believers to know that the money they were giving would be used for the purpose it was given. To that end, they were to choose representatives who would be part of the group that presented the offering in Jerusalem. While we do believe in the integrity of church leaders, we need to have financial safeguards in place within our churches so there are no grounds for accusation. This brings honor to God and can increase the joy of those who give.

In 2 Corinthians 9 we learn that if we give generously, we will reap generously (verse 6). Everything we have comes from God, so why not be generous? If He gave us what we have, He can surely give us more!

I grew up thinking money was evil. I struggle with the fact that I earn a good wage. I pay my tithes, give to missions, that sort of thing. But I've always wondered if being financially comfortable was wrong.

I was relieved when Bill said that God doesn't want us impoverished; He wants us to keep material wealth in perspective.

Wealth is a responsibility to meet the needs of others. I felt my inner tension ease. Now I know I've been given a great responsibility by God, and I'm honored.



God loves it when we are generous with His money. He loves it even more when we give with joy (verse 7). If we can learn to be a channel of blessing, God will begin to pour himself through that channel to others.

Giving does not merely include finances. Giving should be manifested in every area of our lives as well. We can give time. We can give love. We can give forgiveness. And just when we think we might run out, God is there to renew us. He gives us what we need, so that "in all things at all times" we will have what we need to give more (verse 8, NIV)! God will never run out of resources.

3. Trust in God

A. Be Content

1 Timothy 6:6–10, 17–19

Ask: "Why is it wise financial planning to give tithes and offerings to God?" As we discussed in last week's lesson, God is our Provider and Sustainer. In God's economy, learning to live godly lives and being content with what we have is considered to be "great gain" (1 Timothy 6:6). If we are focused on eternity, our temporary material possessions won't seem nearly as important. In fact, if we are seeking God's kingdom above our own life, we won't have to worry about material things. God promises to meet the needs of those who put Him first (see Matthew 6:33).

We didn't bring anything with us into this world when we were born, and we certainly can't take anything out with us when we die (1 Timothy 6:7). And according to verse 8, we should be satisfied with having our basic needs met. Of course, it's not wrong to have more than the clothes on our back. But we must not be continually striving for wealth. If wealth is the focus of our lives, then God is not.

Notes

In fact, if making more money or obtaining more things is the focus of our lives, then we have fallen into the trap of greed. Verse 9 tells us that those who are greedy have succumbed to temptation that will lead them to ruin and destruction. The pull of greed is so strong that some people even abandon their faith in Jesus and end up piercing "themselves through with many sorrows" (verse 10, KJV).

Along this same line, the rich are warned not to be arrogant and not to put their hope in their wealth (verse 17). Instead, they are to trust in God for everything. Instead of glorying in their wealth, those who are rich should be rich in good deeds and generosity (verse 18).

Ask: "Would you classify yourself as being rich? Why or why not?" Though we might not consider ourselves rich, we can still suffer from pride in our self-sufficiency and "trust in uncertain riches" (verse 17, KJV). No matter what our financial status, we need to trust in God to meet our needs and be willing to share with others what God gives us (verse 18).

When we give generously to meet the needs of others, we are storing up treasure in heaven. When we give, we learn what life is really about (verse 19). A life that is lived selfishly is not really life at all. But a life lived in godly contentment and generosity is real living!

B. Be Confident

Hebrews 13:5,6

It is important that we learn to tell the difference between our needs and wants. Our needs, when we get right down to it, are really quite simple. Our list of wants, on the other hand, can be endless. God has promised to supply all our needs (see Philippians 4:19). But He didn't say He would give us all our wants.

Notes

The writer of Hebrews encouraged believers to live in freedom from materialism (Hebrews 13:5). **Ask: "What reason does the author of Hebrews give for living in contentment?"** The author reasoned that God has promised to never leave us or forsake us; therefore we should be content.

At first glance, this answer doesn't seem to go with the ques-

tion. But if we think about it, we realize that God wants to be sufficient for our every need. Once we learn this concept, we can be confident in His care. We won't live in fear of what may happen on this earth, because God is our Helper (verse 6). What a promise! We can trust God with everything—our lives, our families, and our finances.

Discipleship in Action

God has specific principles for money management. God wants believers to trust Him with their finances, and to teach their children to do the same.

Teaching Tip 6: Hand out the work sheet "Family Giving Planner." Instruct students to take time this week to prayerfully consider how their families can be effective stewards of the resources God has given them.

When you model good stewardship, your children learn stewardship. When you model tithing, your children will learn to tithe. And don't forget the other part—teach your children to notice the blessings that God gives to those who are faithful. Be sure to point out to them the rewards of being faithful to God. God loves cheerful, thankful givers!

Ministry in Action

This week, challenge your family to try a "giving experiment." For dinner one evening, serve a simple, inexpensive meal. Then take the money that you would have spent for a normal meal and put it aside. On Sunday, let your children give this extra money in the offering at church, perhaps designating it for a compassion ministry. Afterwards, discuss how the family felt about the experience and what they think God would say about what they did.
